
## Fitness to practise dashboard 01 January 2021 to 31 March 2021 (Q4)

#### **Case progression – at a glance**

- All PCC cases that had not commenced were postponed between 26 March and 3 July 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Substantive hearings recommenced remotely in July 2020.
- The number of live cases older than 52 weeks has reduced to 10 cases.
- In this quarter the PCC sat remotely for 6 substantive hearings, reaching a final determination in all six cases.
- In this quarter the HC sat remotely to review no cases.
- There are now 16 cases referred to the PCC
- The IC also met remotely on two occasions in this quarter. It considered 8 cases of which two were closed and three referred to the PCC
- There are 11 cases that have been referred to the IC by the screeners but not yet considered. This is in line with the IC caseload for the previous quarter.
- The overall caseload has reduced by 17% since the last quarter.





#### **New Referrals**

- The number of referrals in Q4 has remained similar to the previous quarter. This figure, it is noted, is comparable to the referrals received in Q1, when the pandemic started.
- The number of cases closed under the ICP has more than doubled over the last quarter. Seven of these cases relate to the pandemic, specifically with regard to registrants offering their views on the pandemic and also via the use of social media. This is reflected in the referral figure between the screener to the IC.
- The figure for Registrar's allegations has increased over the quarter. These concerns relate to the use of social media by registrants in relation to the pandemic which have been closed under the threshold criteria.

#### **Key Performance Indicators**

- The screener KPI was met for this quarter, having reduced by two weeks from the previous quarter. Although met over the quarter, the KPI has not been met over the course of the year (10 weeks).
- The IC KPI was exceeded by one week over the quarter and was met (26 weeks) over the course of the year.
- The PCC KPI was missed by 14 weeks this quarter. This is due to the cumulative
  effects flowing from the postponement of all substantive PCC hearings in Q2 and
  has had an effect on scheduling since. This is likely to continue to affect our
  performance against the PCC KPI over the next few quarters as we continue to
  list cases affected but also those newer cases being progressed through the
  system, of which have been impacted by the complexities of progressing during a
  pandemic.
- It is noted that the shortest case concluded by the PCC this quarter was 54 weeks, just two weeks over the expected KPI.



• The IC considered and concluded eight cases this quarter. Three were referred to the PCC, three were closed and the remaining two were adjourned.



#### **Professional Conduct Committee**

- In Q4 the PCC considered, and concluded, six substantive cases.
- We have found that hearings conducted remotely take additional time to complete due to factors such as the impact of technical or internet connection issues and the need for more frequent breaks for participants. Initially, without prior experience of running remote hearings, it was challenging to accurately estimate how much additional time would be necessary. This is something we are now better able to estimate.
- The number of hearing days has maintained at a healthy, and steady figure from Q2 and throughout the pandemic. This is due to our ability to hold remote hearings.


