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Background

- 1. S3 of the Osteopaths Act 1993 and the General Osteopathic Council (Recognition of Qualifications) Rules Order of Council 2000 (as amended) provides that, for osteopaths who have obtained a qualification in osteopathy outside the United Kingdom who do not hold a recognised qualification (quality assured by us), they must satisfy the Registrar that they meet our *Osteopathic Practice Standards*.
- 2. In October 2014, the Committee received a paper for discussion which summarised the registration assessment processes that we use for internationally qualified applicants to be eligible to join the Register. It noted different pathways for those applicants with EU/EEA rights and those without.
- 3. That paper outlined our approach to: supporting, training and appraising registration assessors and return to practice reviewers; enhancing our documentation and communications; and next steps for scoping a fuller registration review in combination with the revision of the EU Directive and its transposition into UK law.
- 4. We noted that we would develop a more detailed project plan. The present paper provides the Committee with an update of our approach.

Discussion

- 5. We have built on the initial plans outlined in the October 2014 paper by developing a more detailed project plan and identifying six key project streams. The six project streams align with activities identified in the Business Plans 2014-15 and 2015-16. This work has been planned both to maintain and enhance our registration assessment processes for the integrity of the Register and the quality of service provided to applicants, registrants and patients.
- 6. The Registration Assessment Review project streams are summarised in the Annex. This provides an outline description of what each project stream consists of and timelines for completion. It also identifies reporting lines through the governance structure.
- 7. The Committee has received the following individual project stream papers for the current meeting:
 - a. Registration processes and assessments for EU/EEA rights applicants: alignment with revised Recognition of Professional Qualifications Directive (item 11A)
 - b. Transition of international applicants into practice (item 11B)
 - c. Operation of current registration assessment processes: update on appraisal and training (item 11C).
- 8. The headline document presented in the Annex is supplemented by a detailed project plan, which is used to monitor task progress and the interdependencies of the Registration Assessment Review internally.
