Carrying out CPD remotely

A number of osteopaths have been in touch with us to ask how they can carry on with their CPD and especially the 'learning with others' requirement, in the current circumstances. Engagement, support and community are key features of the CPD scheme and we are keen to help you to keep in touch with others in this time of social isolation. There are lots of ways to do your CPD remotely, with others and for free, for example:

- think about joining or setting up a virtual CPD group
- carry out a <u>case-based discussion</u> on the phone or via video call with colleagues
- try out a practice Peer Discussion Review with a colleague
- explore the free CPD resources on the GOsC's <u>CPD site</u>, including a <u>series of</u> <u>workbooks</u>
- make use of your free access to the International Journal of Osteopathic Medicine and other research journals via the o zone

Free COVID-19 e-learning from HEE

Health Education England (HEE) has created a free-to-access e-learning programme for the UK health and care workforce to help them respond to the COVID-19 situation. Content includes essential guidance from the NHS, UK Government and the World Health Organization. They have also added resources for staff being up-skilled or redeployed and the programme is now accessible for international users. Remember your Professional Indemnity Insurance

It's a legal requirement to have Professional Indemnity Insurance (PII) whether you're seeing patients or not. This legislation is there to protects patients and ensures you're indemnified against liabilities. If you change your status to 'non-practising' (which means you're not seeing or speaking to patients), you need to have 'run-off' cover. You'll need to discuss this with your insurance provider.

- the 'I'm Registered' Mark is for individual osteopaths and includes your unique GOsC registration number
- the 'We're Registered' Mark is for principal osteopaths to display in a group practice
- registration marks are available in English and Welsh
- you should no longer be using the old 'Safe in our hands' Certification Mark as the Registration Marks have replaced these
