## Background

- 1. Under the General Osteopathic Council Business Plan for 2013, Section 2.2, we have outlined the need to 'embed the role of the *Osteopathic Practice Standards* (OPS) as the core principles and values for good osteopathic practice and high standards of professionalism.'. One of the specific activities that we have agreed to complete in order to achieve this is: 'Evaluate the effectiveness of the implementation strategy for the OPS for all stakeholders and identify further evaluation activities or further actions required to embed the OPS, to feed back into the other work of the GOsC'.
- 2. At the Education Committee (now known as the Education and Registration Standards Committee) meeting of 27 November 2012, the Committee considered a draft proposal for the evaluation. It considered the initial evaluation plan and suggested two other forms of data collection, namely consideration of OPS references since 1 September 2012 to ascertain whether there was an increase in references and a review of Fitness to Practise cases over the same period to see if the types of cases changed during this time period.
- 3. Since the meeting, the plan has been refined to produce an updated evaluation plan which is annexed to the paper. The OPS was first published on 1 September 2011 and it was a full year before it came into effect on 1 September 2012. The evaluation will focus on the period 1 September 2011 to 31 August 2013 giving a data set which spans a year either side of the implementation date, accounting for the work that we undertook in preparation of the implementation. The exception to this will be data collected from consultations on the OPS document when it was nearing completion as these will prove useful in indicating awareness of the changes that were due to take place to the standards.

#### Discussion

- 4. The objective of this paper is to inform the newly formed Osteopathic Practice Committee (OPC) of the work related to the OPS implementation evaluation.
- 5. Next steps will involve the collection of the various pieces of information outlined and the production of a report on the findings for the OPC at its meeting of 27 February 2014.
